A Word from the Pastor

How is your Lent going so far?

It seemed to come kind of early on Valentine's Day in February, Plus, Easter is at the end of March, and that seems early too!



Our sermon series for Wednesdays in Lent is, Not Perfect, Just Forgiven. In order to understand the concept of forgiveness better. I shared some information derived from a PhD in Counseling Psychology named Blaine Rader.

Dr. Rader's experience and research led him to create a list of qualities and characteristics that are often substituted for forgiveness and thus not as **effective.** Please see the list below that I shared with the congregation on Ash Wednesday evening.

True Forgiveness Is Not

- Apathetic
- * Just Feeling Bad
- Avoiding
- **Making Deals**
- Forgetting
- **Painless**
- Excusing
- * Pretending
- Explaining
- * Tolerating

Given the feedback I received afterwards, it was clear than almost all of the worshippers had never seen such a chart before; so I thought it would be a good idea to include it this newsletter.

Why? Because Lent is a time to focus especially on forgiveness. Repenting to receive mercy includes three steps: 1) feeling bad about what we have thought, said or done, 2) apologizing to those we have wronged, and 3) turning away from our sins in order to reconnect with God and others.

Yet even in Lent, this is a challenging issue. Dr. Rader suggests that we may not seek forgiveness because we are afraid of talking with whomever we have hurt. In other words, we can be conflict averse.

Jesus suffered, died and was resurrected so that we can receive God's forgiveness in the asking. It is unmerited grace! He also taught that we need to forgive one another just as God forgives us. It may not be easy, but it can be wonderfully fulfilling.

May we share the grace God has already given to us with others!







Stewardship of God's Creation

Disposable ~ Kendra Eppler

"Disposable" is an interesting concept. It has been weighing on my mind since seeing a baggie commercial that sought to positively advertise the product as being disposable.

According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary (online), disposable means "designed to be used once or only a limited number of times and then thrown away."

While throwing a "disposable" product away after use aligns with the definition, I continue to ponder whether a product is truly disposable if its end-of-life is a landfill. The purpose of a landfill is to keep trash and their related contaminants in (i.e., out of the rest of the environment). They are not designed to facilitate the decomposition of items.

Is something really "disposable" if it will be around, even in a landfill, for many years after it has been used? Following are a few examples of how long certain items take to break down when placed in the trash (landfill):

- Plastic bags 10-20 years
- Aluminum cans 80-200 years
- Paper waste 2-6 weeks
- Orange peel 6 months
- Glass may never decompose
- Styrofoam does not biodegrade

We can demonstrate care for creation by minimizing use of "disposable" items, particularly one-time or few-time use items, that are destined for a landfill. We can reduce landfill use and further demonstrate care for creation by recycling or composting those items those items eligible for recycling or composting.
